She has been a crucial contributor to the Food Project's growth over the past two years, a program designed to aid our patients facing high levels of food insecurity. In partnership with Feeding San Diego, UCSD Student-Run Free Clinic's Food Project is able to provide approximately 100 pounds of fresh produce and shelf-stable food to each patient who chooses to participate in the program.

As the Food Project Director, Kalodiah manages the ordering, receiving, and delivery of food directly to our patients on a weekly basis. Growing up in an immigrant family, Kalodiah has seen first-hand the importance of nutrition on health and has channeled her passion for serving the community through her work for the Food Project. "Being part of an organization that provides comfort and resources to people during their most vulnerable times is truly inspiring," Kalodiah

remarks. Kalodiah's commitment to the UCSD Student-Run Free Clinic has inspired leaders and volunteers alike and we are thankful for her continual work to better our patients' lives.
